STAYING COVID SAFE



WASH YOUR HANDS

Wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds, or clean and sanitise them with an alcohol-based hand sanitiser.

John and Val Sheehan came from the beachside village of Wooli six years ago to Clarence Village (Stage 2).

John's health had taken a blow with a diagnosis of prostate cancer so being closer to medical services in Grafton was important.

"The doctors gave him about 12 months when we moved here but here he is, still going," Val said.

While the couple do spend a lot of time chasing medical appointments, they enjoy life as part of the village community. "We've made a lot of friends here. Everybody here in the village is so lovely, just like family, always popping in to have a yarn," Val said.

The Sheehans have been married for 61 years, their ceremony held at St Matthew's in South Grafton when it was "up the hill".

It was a whirlwind romance that began as a blind date.

John, a Lower Clarence lad, had another mate called John (North) from Brooms Head.

"He was going with one of my girlfriends at the time and was coming up to Grafton to see her and bringing John (Sheehan) with him. They called me to see if I'd make up a foursome."

Initially Val said no "because she wasn't going to out with someone she hadn't seen".

Luckily, they convinced her to go along to the Saraton Theatre that night in the late 1950s and the pair "just clicked".

"We met up in Maclean the next day and had a second date in Yamba," Val said. "John (North) and my girlfriend only stayed together for a little while after that but here we still are."

"Two children, four grandchildren, five great grandchildren and another two on the way."

The couple had lived in their South Grafton house at the rural end of Tyson St for almost 60 years moving in three years after they were married in 1961. “We still have the paddock up there.”

It’s the place they raised two boys James and Craig and welcomed their other pride and joy — a race horse. Young Craig was born on their property and named after their youngest son as the foal arrived on his third birthday.

It brought the Murrays lots of happiness and enough prize money in one race to pay off the rest of their house in 1974. Young Craig was a big part of the Murrays life, “ran 90 odd races and had 43 wins” including plenty of cups victories, Christmas, Orara, Jacaranda, Tabulam, often multiple times.

The couple worked their whole lives, Max in mines and later his bobcat business, while serving as a Grafton City Councillor for 9 years until amalgamation, and on the board at Dougherty Villa where he stayed for 21 years.

Besides doing the books for the family’s bobcat business, Marie worked in retail for a few institutions include Harvey Brothers Jewellers and as manager of George Gooley’s Discount Clothing Market.

The couple met at another institution, the Grafton Barn, and recently celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary on December 23 last year.

Max has always been a keen artist, his drawings can be seen around the house, as can Marie’s knack for gardening. They also enjoy seeing their granddaughter’s family including two great grandchildren who recently moved back here.

“We love it here, if we go anywhere next, it’ll be straight to Dougherty Villa,” Max said.

A working relationship

Most weekdays you can find husband and wife duo of 28 years Margaret and Darrel Kleindienst in the kitchens at Clarence Village — Margaret at Dougherty Villa, Darrel over at Clarence on Queen.

Margaret wins on the longevity front having started her run of preparing meals at Dougherty Villa when it first opened, almost 30 years ago, Darrel has been working on the menus at Queen Street for the past seven.

The pair met in Armidale in the 1980s, Darrel's hometown and where Margaret used to teach TAFE, and after friendship turned to romance Darrel moved down to Grafton and they married at Grafton's Presbyterian Church in 1993.

Up until that point Darrel's career had always been in retail but the opportunity to try his hand at catering for residents arrived at the same

time his youngest son did.

“When Margaret took 14-months maternity leave I filled in for her at Dougherty Villa.”

It was a few years down the track before Darrel left retail behind and went into full-time food preparation at Queen Street, a role that he says is very different to Margaret's which caters for high care residents.

Margaret's popularity with the Dougherty Villa crowd is legendary so much so when she and Darrel married the demand for them to put in an appearance on the day was never going to be ignored.

“I'm not that sort of person but they wanted us come in and parade around so we did. The residents were family back then and they are still family.”

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Couple's moving story

Clarence Village residents Jillyne and Alwyn Campbell know a thing or two about moving house. They've done it 14 times.

Thankfully things settled down for the last two including their move to Clarence Village (Stage 4) 11 years ago.

Before that they were in their home South Grafton for another 11.

The other moves were more frequent, taking them all over the North Coast and down to Sydney (twice) before returning to the Clarence Valley for good.

The couple met in their hometown of Kempsey, and it was Alwyn's work as dairy chemist that kept them on the move. Jillyne, a former telephonist, and Alwyn met at a hometown dance and married at Macksville, where Jillyne's parent lived.

"We had 210 guests which is still a record I believe," Jillyne said.

When they first arrived in Grafton for dairy industry work it was 1965 when "there were 750 dairy farms".

"There are only three left now", Alwyn said. When his final place of employ in the industry, the Ulmarra Dairy Co-op closed, Alwyn and Jillyne bought and ran the Captain Cook Store in South Grafton where they sold milk from 1992-96.

Now enjoying retirement, the couple have been married for 59 years this year, raised two children, and welcomed seven grandchildren and seven great children and never had a "dinky-di argument."

"We've had a good life and been very fortunate, Jillyne said.

"And we love it here, Alwyn said. "You can wave to people from the kitchen window, or when you leave in the car. We're not in each other's pockets but we're here to help when people need it."



Living in pandemic times

Three days before Christmas, Dougherty Villa facility manager Mandy Stark received news that a staff member had tested positive to COVID-19 on a Rapid Antigen Test.

Contract tracing commenced immediately within the aged care home to identify close contacts who were also tested. The following day, a close contact employee who had attended the same infection site also tested positive on RAT test. Both staff did return a positive PCR result.

Due to the identification of two positive COVID cases in the staff, the Local Health District (LHD) and Public Health Unit (PHU) and Commonwealth Dougherty Villa was notified that Dougherty Villa was an identified 'Exposure site.'

Under guidance of the PHU Dougherty Villa was placed into lockdown at 3.30pm on December 23.

Following the risk assessment protocols and its COVID outbreak management plan, management were able to quickly put into place the necessary precautions, and determined that only Magnolia Wing needed to be placed in full precautions.

In line with the guidelines at the time, PCR testing of all residents was undertaken on December 23 and 27 and January 3. All 69 residents remained negative.

On January 3, another staff member tested positive but identified as low risk within the home, as they were not in direct contact with residents.

Due to the Christmas/New Year period, and the overwhelming number of aged care homes with outbreaks/exposures in the district (more than 50%) there was very limited contact/support from PHU/LHD.

Based on the clinical evidence available in was decided by the senior clinical team on the January 6 to reduce the restrictions on Magnolia wing.

Dougherty Villa has had no further staff members test positive since January 3. Rapid Antigen testing of all staff on a daily/every second day routine commenced as of January 17.

All residents who were eligible received their booster shots on January 13. Those who were not eligible will be able to access vaccination through Grafton Base Infection Control process.

Dougherty Villa has recommenced limited visitation for all residents, in line with new protocols and availability of RATs.

Currently, all residents are eating in separate dining rooms and limiting cross unit activities to prevent the risk of any cross-transmission.

While the Health Dept guidelines have changed several times in the past few weeks, Dougherty Villa are continuing to monitor the situation with a 'common sense' approach to risk management.

As access to RAT tests is improving, Dougherty Villa continue testing staff daily and all visitors to the home.

While there is no guarantee that management can keep COVID-19 out of the home, they are continuing to monitor our PPE, and maintain infection control procedures.

Dougherty Villa received an Infection Control audit which was undertaken by the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission on February 3, and management will receive a report in the coming weeks.

"It's really like working for a big family here. We all look out for each other. I love it and will never be going back to construction."

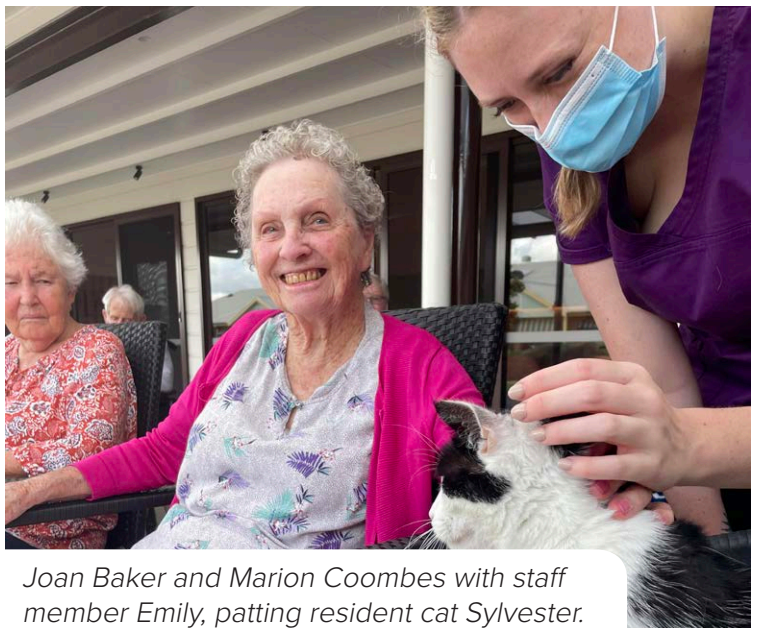

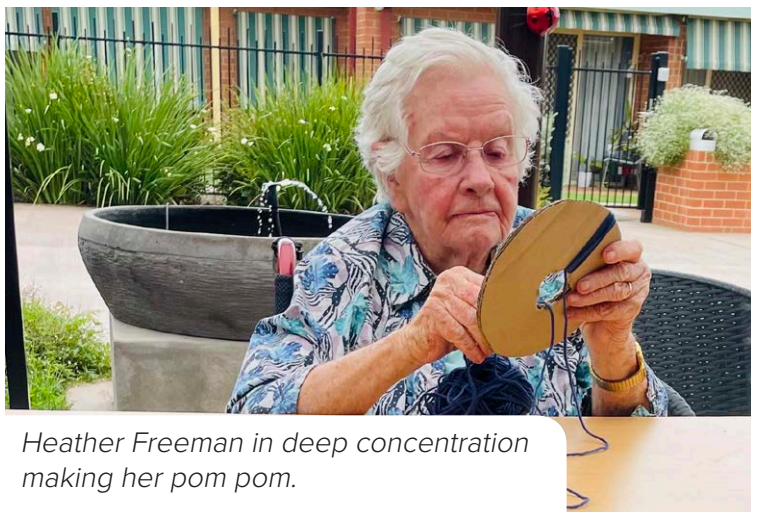
