Grafton needs more affordable housing for seniors, not less and charging charities more for the same services makes no sense.

Hopefully by the next issue of the Village Voice Clarence Village will be a registered Community Housing Provider. This will open up more sources of funding for affordable housing to hopefully let us get going with our Armidale St development. Plenty more news to come in 2024!

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Steve's play headed for the Sydney stage

You remember that one-man play written by Clarence Village resident and playwright Steve North called *The Last Rehearsal*? We mentioned it last year in these pages hoping to see it performed at the Joan Muir Hall at some stage in 2024.

Well, we may have to wait because Steve has gone and won a national competition with that play, and as part of his prize his play will be performed at the Walsh Bay Arts Precinct in Sydney, the home of the acclaimed Sydney Dance and Sydney Theatre Companies.

Steve said the Clarence Village office encouraged and helped him to enter the competition *Scenes from the Sage Age* (for over 60s playwrights) and he was still overwhelmed by the unexpected win.

"The office got me over there under false pretences saying they wanted to talk about putting the play on here and then they said 'you know that play we submitted for you — you won'. I said 'what!' I was in total shock."

The Scene Theatre in Sydney called to

confirm Steve's win and told him to not be too surprised he was chosen.

"I'm not sure who is going to perform my play. I only need one actor. It could be someone famous. I have no idea."

Steve's play is one of the eight works selected from a field of 164 entries from around Australia.

"They are all short plays, none longer than 20 mins so they will all be performed on the same day in front of a live audience. Only been handful of people have read my play and nobody has ever guessed the ending."

Steve will travel down to Sydney to see his play come to life in March but the playwright and busy actor will have some schedule juggling to do.

"I'm in a play in Coffs Harbour in March. Our opening night is couple of nights after the Sydney performance."

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Reflecting on the life of Elder Heather Monaghan

Dougherty Villa and the Clarence Valley community lost one of its respected members of the Aboriginal community, Elder Heather Carmon Monaghan on January 4, 2024.

Affectionately known as Charney to her family, Heather Daley was born on the Clarence River near the Peartree at Baryulgil, growing up in small river huts until land known as the Baryulgil square was granted by the Hordern family's Yulgilbar Pastoral Co.

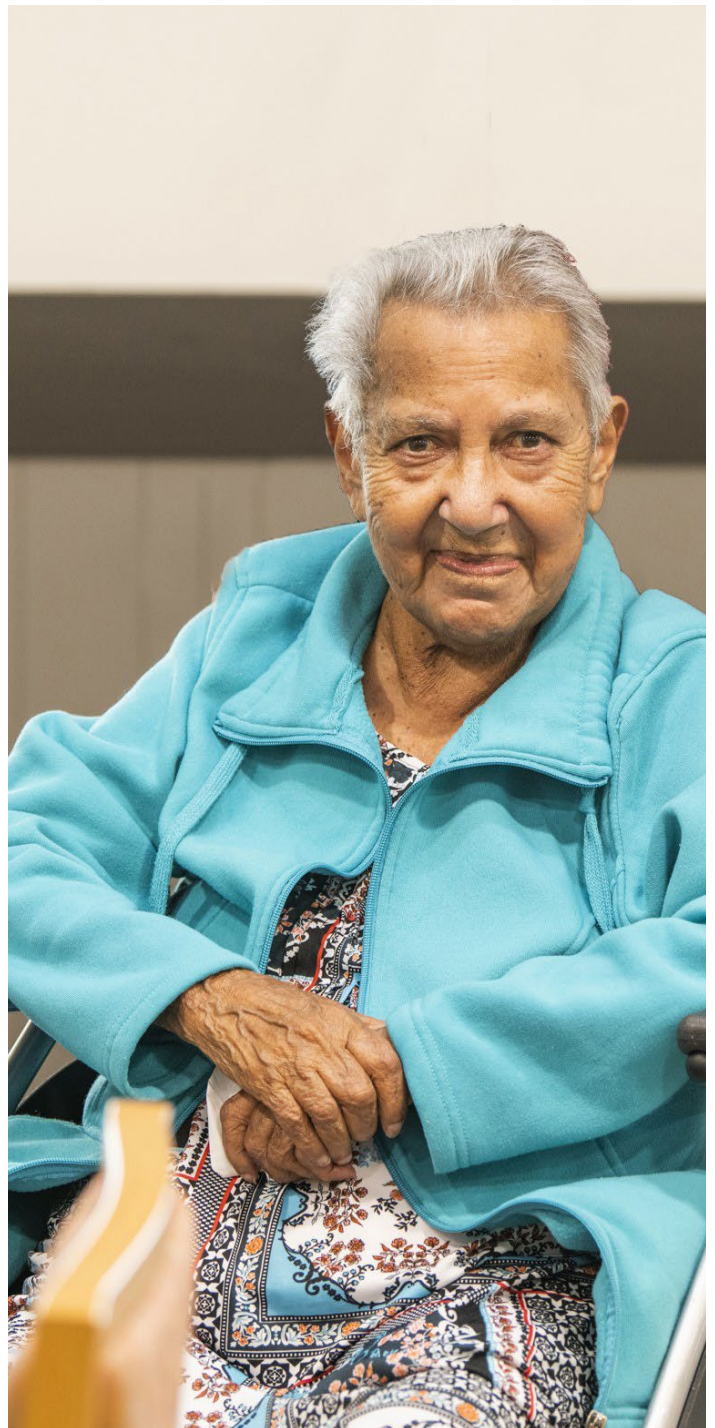
Heather lived in a two-room house with a kitchen, along with her parents and nine siblings. When Heather was growing up there was a real community atmosphere where people looked after one another and respected their Elders.

Aboriginal children were not allowed to attend the mainstream school in that era, so the community created their own school located near the dump site in the days where the Asbestos mine was the main employer.

Her father Norman was a staunch advocate of education, his children needing to be “really sick” to miss a day, although a cheeky Heather admitted to her kids she would occasionally play hooky by hiding in the bushes.

While she enjoyed some freedoms, families at Baryulgil were still sanctioned by the Aboriginal Protection Board (APB) in those days and any education around culture and language was not allowed. Heather's connection came from her family and community.

At 15, Heather was required to do domestic duties and sent to Sydney to work and live with other families to perform these tasks. After training she was sent to a station out west until she turned 18 and moved to Nyngan.



There she met her husband Robert Snr, a 21yo larrikin according to his family. After marrying and the arrival of three babies — Sharon, Deb and Robert — Heather moved back home to Baryulgil with her young family.

Mixed marriages were frowned upon by the APB so increased scrutiny was forthcoming. Daily visits weren't out of the question at the Monaghan household but this didn't deter the couple with two more children, Scott and Carmel, completing the Monaghan gang of seven.

Heather never forgot those difficult times which is why she enrolled to vote for the first time in 2023. She wanted to make her sure her YES vote would be counted when it came to recognising Aboriginal people in the Constitution. Being told she was not eligible to vote when she was a young person had always kept her away from the polling booth.

Heather enjoyed family life at Baryulgil, fishing, and wandering the riverbanks with her children, life on the river was paradise to Heather. "If she ran out of fishing worms, she would dig for more," Sharon recalled.

Fishing was Heather's comfort place and would do it all weather except during thunderstorms. "She didn't like thunder or lightning."

She had her special spots along the river and a bucket ready when the kids got home from school. She fished her whole life until she couldn't but still liked to drive and sit by the river while her kids threw in a line for her.

Heather worked for many years but her family and kids always came first, never forgetting her community and her Elders. "She would often cook up a pot of stew and bread and the eldest in the family would run it over to an Elder."

A great cook, Heather could make delicious meals using very few ingredients, daughter Sharon recalled.

She loved playing games like Housie and cards but could get upset if she went home empty handed. "She loved winning the chocolates."

Heather liked a party and a sing-a-long especially with her brothers and sisters. Always

kept for company, during the last 14 months of her life spent at Dougherty Villa Heather enjoyed her time there immensely. "She loved it because she fitted in, and made many friends, both staff and residents alike."

A kind and thoughtful lady, Heather also had a cheeky side and could put a person in their place if they needed it.

While her five children, nine grandchildren, sixteen great grandchildren, and community, will miss her, Sharon said her mum had a full life and filled theirs with lots of love and laughter. "She was a beautiful spirited lady and will be missed for her wisdom, smile, and cheeky Queen wave."

"Our family would like to give special thanks to Dougherty Villa management and staff, and the residents for allowing us to spend as much time as we did with mum. The place made her happy. She loved her bus trips. She never missed them."

As organisations grow and age sometimes they can forget what they're about. Homeownership and aged care

A question I hear frequently when a person is considering entry to residential care is “Will the government make me sell my home?”

The answer is no, it legally belongs to the person who holds the title. However, for many people entering residential care, the fees can be more sustainable if you choose to do so.

Your aged care costs are calculated based on your income and assets. Your former home is usually included as an asset in this calculation, however if certain criteria is met it can be exempt.

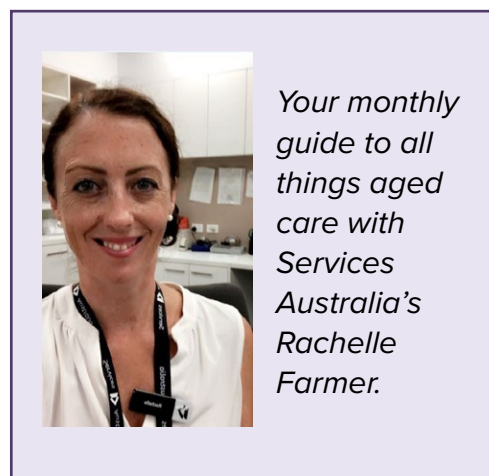
One of the most common reasons for exemption is when a “protected person” resides in your home while you are in care. A protected person maybe:

-  **1.** Your partner;
-  **2.** A close relative who has been living in the home for at least five years prior to your entry, and is eligible for an income support payment;
-  **3.** A carer who has been living in the home for at least two years prior to your entry, and is eligible for an income support payment;

Alternatively, your former home could be exempt under hardship, if you own it jointly with one or more other persons and they do not intend to sell the home, or, if you have attempted to, but are unable to sell it.

In these circumstances your former home is termed an “unrealisable asset”.

All exemptions are reviewed over time and can be revoked if the criteria ceases to be met. There may also be implications for your pension entitlement after two years.

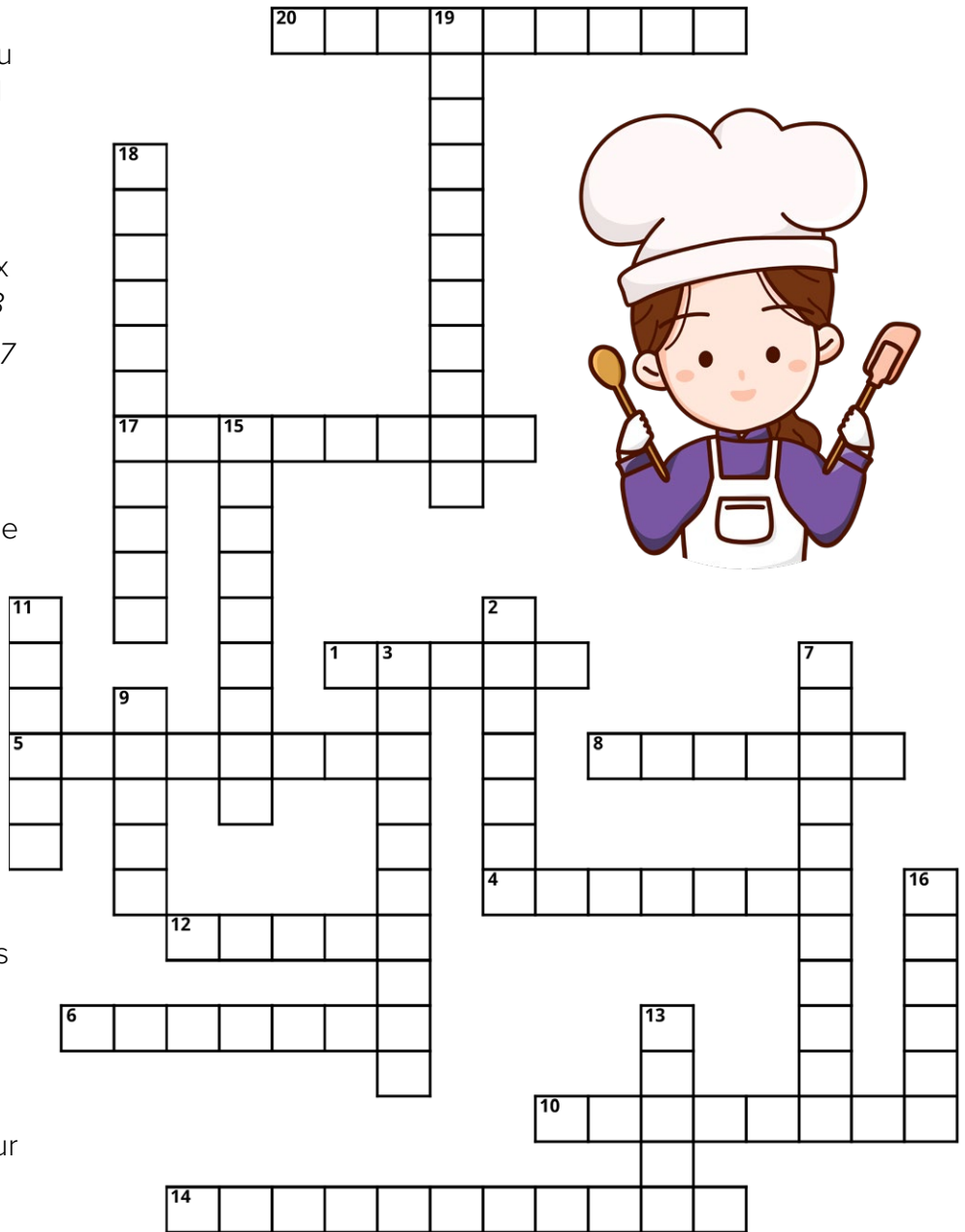

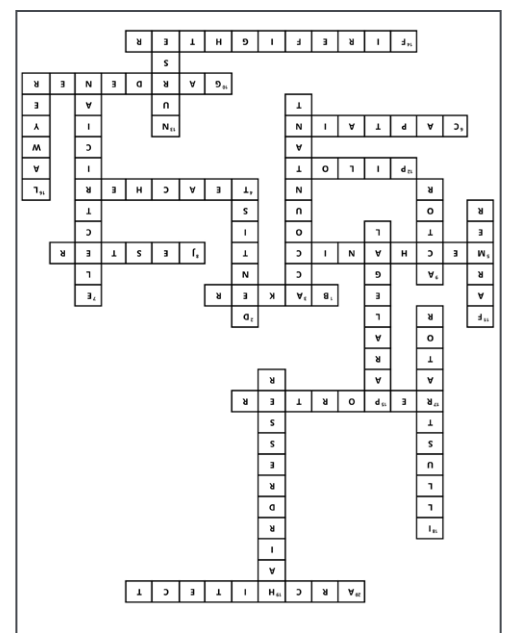
