# Connecting residents to aged care services

Two information mornings hosted by Clarence Village in February, attracted a large number of village residents and members of the public.

Held at the Joan Muir Community Centre and Clarence Gardens, Aged Care Specialist Officer Rachelle Farmer presented the informative morning which covered all aspects of the My Aged Care services available to Grafton residents looking to navigate the aged care journey.

The aged care specialist role is a relatively new one (a result of the 2021 Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety) and Grafton was one of the first places to have its own specialist on site.

Rachelle said up until then easily accessible avenues for people to find out about their aged care choices was lacking.

"Having the opportunity to sit down, faceto-face and bring a support person or family member with them and find this information has been such a great thing. Now everybody can access to what they deserve and are entitled to."

Rachelle spent the morning explaining all the options available from in-home assistance packages through to residential care.

"It really gives people peace of mind when you receive helpful advice. I'm here to make sure nobody misses out on anything that is available to them."

Rachelle will be hosting another persentation at Clarence on Queen on Thursday March 16 at 10.30am.

# A birthday fit for a king's congratulations

Dougherty Villa resident and long-time Clarence Villager Levena Elkerton celebrated her 100th birthday on February 16.

The newly crowned centenarian received the attention she deserved, showered with well wishes and floral deliveries for the duration of the day.

"I was getting birthday wishes (from staff) before the sun came up," she said.

Overwhelmed by all the beautiful tributes her family has organised for the occasion, Levena's room was full of photographic displays and three albums of memories and birthday greetings from all the dignitaries including the Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and HRH King Charles.

Levena said she felt lucky to have reached 100 but said her good genes may also have played a role in that. "My mum lived to 100. She was two month's off 101 when she passed."

While a century of living means there's a lot to reflect upon, Levena said her time with the Girl Guides was a highlight for her.

"I was with them for 40 years and did a lot of

work with Shirley Adams."

Levena Lewis grew up on a remote Queensland sheep station and was schooled by correspondence. "No person to person, all paper."

Her parents sent her to live with her grandparents in Glen Innes so she could get a taste of "a proper school".

"Mum and dad then moved to Grafton so I joined them and that was that. I met my husband there and that's the end of the story."

Levena met Reginald 'Mick' Elkerton at tennis, her favourite sport.

She raised four children at their South Grafton home, a lot of that single-handedly after Mick passed away from cancer aged at 53. "I still had two children at school."

While that seems a lifetime ago, Levena's approach to making the most of difficult circumstances was evident from a young age.

"I badly wanted a piano when I was little but we lived on a station so I got a kerosene tin and with black and white chalk and made my own."

# Dougherty Villa celebrates thirty years: more than just a roof over residents' heads

An icon in the aged care landscape here in the Clarence Valley, Dougherty Villa celebrated its 30th anniversary in February with a special lunch gathering and cake-cutting.

Since opening in 1993 the Villa has moved with the times, expanding its footprint and services while remaining at the leading edge of contemporary aged care expectations.

It continues to provide the highest quality care in a safe and friendly environment where dignity and understanding is at the heart of everything it does.

CEO Duncan McKimm reflected on the Villa's journey at the recent celebratory lunch explaining that when the idea for an aged care facility was first floated by the Clarence Village Board its chair Bill Dougherty said at the time 'If not us, who will do it?'

"And we're sitting in the results of that effort," Mr McKimm said. "Thirty years of hard work on behalf of the community, and by all of our staff, has seen us build this lovely home and we are very proud and privileged to have you all living in it."

# Meet the candidates - NSW State Election: don't forget to vote on March 25

The Village Voice asked four candidates running for the NSW seat of Clarence (representing the major parties and high profile Independent) what they would stand for with regards to aged care if elected as the Member for Clarence:



Being a local born and bred I have a solid understanding of Clarence Village and the wonderful services they provide. While I was Mayor for some time I was also patron of your organisation.

The NSW Nationals (if elected as the next Government) are committed to better health care, including a \$264 million new Grafton Base Hospital. We are the only party that has secured funds and is committed to build the hospital.

The \$250 Regional Seniors travel card helps with the cost of transport. It is only for seniors and only in regional NSW. Again, the Nationals are the only party committed to the card. The Nationals are driving down the cost of living with more than 70 rebates for seniors. Should I be elected on March 25 I will continue to carry on the work done by Chris Gulaptis over the past 12 years in making sure we get our fair share.

If elected I will be advocating on these Aged Care issues:

- that the NSW Government through the National Cabinet process, urge the Australian Government to implement a mandatory staffing mix ratio in aged care facilities, including on site registered nurses, personal care workers and allied health professionals, based on the needs of residents to ensure their safety and dignity at all times.
- to enhance the Poisons and Therapeutic Goods Regulation 2008, currently subject to review, to ensure the availability of registered nurses on site at all times to safely manage, procure and administer medications as required by residents, particularly with respect to end-of-life and palliative care, in all residential aged care facilities in the state.
- to work to address sexual assault in nursing homes by advocating for a national register that will enable providers to check if staff have been implicated in the sexual assault of a resident.







My name is Leon Ankersmit. I live in Maclean with my wife and three school-aged children. We have lived in the Clarence for the past 15 years. I am an executive manager in the field of community services, most recently as CEO of Anglicare North Coast.

We need a representative who has skills and energy, a vision for the district and the right motivations and affiliations to deliver outcomes during the next term of government. My ability to collaborate and forge partnership in any situation including conflicting interests is the most powerful skill I bring to the role.


I love meeting people and making sure that we attend to the needs of those who are struggling. Whether aged care workers, nurses, cleaning staff or even elderly people who are facing high cost of living on limited income, I will be a strong representative for Clarence in a NSW Labor government.

While it is largely a federal matter, the Greens believe the NSW government must play an active role in the provision, regulation and support of aged care services. A key role for Government is the long-term planning for services, based on needs analysis for each region and consultation with older people. This consultation must include First Nations peoples so that the full range of services are planned to be delivered in a culturally appropriate manner.

We believe all forms of Australian residential care should be moved to a model that allows for partner placement. We would seek to abolish all forms of legal exemptions to discrimination laws by those providing aged care so that this can include our LGBTIQA+ elders.

We also believe the primary objective of residential care for older people is to provide a high standard of care rather than return high profits to the facility owners. You can read our policy in full at:


